This list is intended as a guide to some of the current popular books available for boys entering the Twos. The aim is to help boys and parents choose reading material that is challenging, rewarding or just plain fun, whilst being age appropriate.

As there are limits on the number of books that can be included in this list, we have often chosen just one title by a particular author. We have also not included many well-loved titles or authors (such as J.K. Rowling, Philip Pullman etc) because you will already be familiar with them.

Book shops often categorise their books in the age brackets 9-12yrs and 13+. Therefore Years 7 & 8 can be a tricky year as they are in between two age ranges. They may feel they have outgrown the younger category, however, the next category can be quite a jump in the maturity of content and language. It is good to be aware of this.

We have tried to include a variety of books for different reading ability. It may be that 'shared reading' is still a good way to enjoy some of the more challenging stories. Being read to is still a very valuable activity for the boys, increasing their vocabulary and their understanding of more complex narrative. Or read a book alongside your son so that you can discuss some of the issues raised by the content.

These suggestions are subjective, there will be some books in this list you try but do not enjoy. We hope there will be many you love!

Noa Blake is just another normal 15 year old with exams looming. Except in The Territory normal isn't normal. The Mysterious Benedict Society Trenton Lee Stewart

When a peculiar advertisement appears in the newspaper for children to take part in a secret mission, children everywhere sit a series of mysterious tests. In the end, just four children succeed: Reynie, Kate, Sticky and Constance. They have three things in common: they are all honest, all remarkably talented and all orphans. They must go undercover at the Learning Institute for the Very Enlightened where the only rule is that there are no rules. There they must work as a team to save not only themselves, but also the world outside the walls.



The Disappearances Emily Bain Murphy

Every seven years something disappears in the remote town of Sterling: people's reflections, the stars in the sky, the ability to dream. Aila realises that her mother may be to blame for the curse. But some mysteries are buried very deep and some secrets want to stay hidden - and one young woman's desire to uncover the truth may not be enough to save Sterling from the past.



Ink Alice Broadway

Forget books on paper. In Leora's world, there's only one place to tell a person's story: their skin. Every action. Every deed. Every success and every failure – tattooed on your body forever. Let's hope you have a good story to tell. But what about when you die? Well – that's still not the end of the story. Your tattoos get removed and made into a Skin Book: a record of your good life. So when Leora's father dies, she wants to honour him like this. Except that something is very wrong. His ink has been edited; his book isn't complete. Who has done this – and why? Did she ever really know him at all?



Kick Mitch Johnson

Budi's plan is simple. He's going to be a star. Budi's going to play for the greatest team on earth, instead of sweating over each stitch he sews, each football boot he makes. But one unlucky kick brings Budi's world crashing down. Now he owes the Dragon, the most dangerous man in Jakarta. Soon it isn't only Budi's dreams at stake, but his life. 
Beyond the Bright Sea Lauren Wolk
